Since 1956, Monroe County Humane Association (MCHA) has been dedicated to improving the lives of animals and their human companions.

At the heart of that work is a simple goal: **keep families together**. MCHA provides practical support that helps pets stay healthy, safe, and at home through our nonprofit veterinary clinic, pet food pantry, crisis housing, spay/neuter assistance, street outreach, mobile vaccine clinics, and educational programs.

Dear MCHA Family,

In 2025, Monroe County Humane Association helped even more pets receive the care, food, safety, and support they needed. We expanded our reach, strengthened our programs, and served more animals across nearly every area of our work. **None of this would have been possible without you.**

Our Crisis Housing Program provided **2,433 days of safe care for pets** whose families were experiencing hospitalization, domestic violence, addiction recovery, housing instability, and other emergencies. This represents a **67% increase over 2024**.

Through our Nonprofit Veterinary Clinic, we delivered **more than \$154,000 in free veterinary care**. More than 3,500 active patients relied on the clinic for wellness visits, treatment for illness and injury, diagnostic testing, medications, and ongoing care.

Our Pet Food and Supply Pantry **distributed approximately 30,000 pounds of pet food** to hungry cats and dogs. Our monthly **Mobile Vaccine Clinics served 717 pets**, bringing affordable preventive care directly into the community.

We provided **\$14,050 in spay or neuter surgery assistance**, provided veterinary care and supplies to hundreds of pets through our Street Outreach Program, and worked alongside local shelters and animal welfare organizations to help animals throughout South Central Indiana.

As you read this Annual Report, we hope you see your impact throughout its pages. Your generosity, time, partnership, and trust helped us say yes when pets and the people who love them needed care and support.

Thank you for believing in this work and helping us build a community where every pet has access to the care and resources they need.

PET FOOD PANTRY

Thousands of pets in our community face empty food bowls. Monroe County Humane Association's Pet Food Pantry provides nutritious food to hungry cats and dogs across Monroe County and nearby communities.

The program does more than fill bowls. It helps pets remain healthy and in homes while reducing unnecessary shelter surrenders. This preserves limited shelter space for animals with nowhere else to go.

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, the Pet Food Pantry **distributed more than 30,000 pounds of food**, over 15 tons that nourished thousands of hungry pets across the community. This represents a **6.6% increase over 2024** and a **20% increase since 2023**.

MCHA also supplied food to Bloomington Animal Care & Control, Area 10 Agency on Aging, Mother Hubbard's Cupboard, and other community partners. These partnerships helped food reach more hungry pets throughout our community.

Each month, more than 500 families received support, **keeping thousands of pets fed**, healthy, and in homes. Generous donations from individuals, businesses, foundations, and community partners made this work possible. Whenever possible, food was distributed in reusable containers to reduce single-use plastics.

NONPROFIT VETERINARY CLINIC

MCHA's Nonprofit Veterinary Clinic provides wellness and sick exams, vaccinations, radiology, laboratory testing, treatment for common illnesses and injuries, chronic disease management, limited surgical services, and end-of-life care. Our veterinary team works each day to provide high-quality care, and we work hard to keep that care as affordable as possible.

Affordable care helps pets stay healthy, while timely treatment reduces suffering and prevents manageable conditions from becoming more serious. When preventable or easily treated conditions go unmanaged, they can lead to unnecessary suffering, costly emergencies, and shelter surrender. Vaccinations and routine care also help limit the spread of diseases that can affect animals and people.

Rising costs and limited appointment availability can force families to delay or forgo veterinary care. With demand consistently exceeding capacity, MCHA works to reduce financial barriers, expand access to essential services, and keep pets healthy and at home with the people who love them.

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, the Nonprofit Veterinary Clinic provided **over \$154,000 in free care to pets in need**—giving animals with limited options the treatment they needed to stay with their families. The clinic supports more than 3,600 active patient accounts (1,444 cats & 2,234 dogs), underscoring the high demand.

84% of pets treated came from households near or below the federal poverty level, with many receiving additional financial support through medical care grant funding. Alongside medical services, we also provided education and resources to help owners care for their pets and manage chronic conditions. By removing barriers to care, the clinic **keeps pets healthy and families together**.

CRISIS HOUSING

The Crisis Housing Program provides temporary shelter and care for cats and dogs whose families are facing life-disrupting emergencies. Located in MCHA's E. Susan Bartlett Building, the program **gives pets a safe, stable place to stay while their owners navigate hospitalization, domestic violence, eviction, incarceration, substance use treatment, natural disasters, or other crisis.**

Pets receive food, daily care, and necessary veterinary services. Each pet is also evaluated for spay or neuter services paid for by MCHA, supporting MCHA's work to reduce pet overpopulation.

MCHA partners with local social service agencies to remove a barrier that can keep people from seeking treatment, medical care, or safety. The Urban Resource Institute reports that **97% of domestic violence survivors consider their pets when deciding whether to seek shelter, and more than half would not seek shelter without them.** Crisis Housing keeps pets safe while their owners seek help and regain stability.

With a reunification rate of 95% to 97%, the program preserves families while **preventing unnecessary shelter surrenders and reducing pressure on the broader animal welfare system.**

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, the Crisis Housing Program **provided 2,433 days of care to pets in urgent need**, a **67% increase over 2024** and nearly 11 times the care provided when the program began in 2021.

Volunteers played an essential role, helping care for animals during evenings and weekends. Foster families also helped extend the program's capacity beyond the physical space available at MCHA's campus.

SPAY AND NEUTER ASSISTANCE

The Spay and Neuter Assistance Program provides financial support to help pet owners afford surgery through participating veterinary providers. By reducing the cost, the voucher program **makes spay and neuter services accessible** to families who might otherwise be unable to afford them.

Spaying and neutering **prevent unwanted litters and reduce the number of animals entering overcrowded shelters**. These procedures also protect long-term health by lowering the risk of certain cancers, infections, and reproductive diseases. Expanding access prevents future suffering, supports responsible pet ownership, and helps more pets remain healthy and at home.

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, MCHA **issued 339 spay and neuter vouchers, a 50% increase** over the previous year. This equates to a **\$14,050 value**. The vouchers covered a portion of the surgery cost through partner clinics, with pet owners contributing a reduced copay. Support from the Lilly Scholars Network funded 150 of these procedures and helped make this growth possible.

These 339 vouchers helped prevent hundreds of unwanted litters in the years ahead, reducing shelter crowding and sparing animals from the illness, suffering, homelessness, and early death that often affect unwanted puppies and kittens.

STREET OUTREACH

MCHA's Street Outreach Program provides **free, field-based veterinary care to pets living with people experiencing homelessness or housing instability**. The program meets people and their pets where they are, including outdoors, in vehicles, and in temporary or transitional housing.

Street Outreach works closely with Bloomington Police Department, social workers, and community partners including Beacon, Crawford Apartments, Middle Way House, Kinser Flats, Bloomington Housing Authority, Wheeler Mission, and Centerstone. Together, these partners identify pet owners who might otherwise have no access to veterinary care.

Pets receive vaccinations, wellness and sick care, medications, preventatives, and other necessary services at no cost. **Keeping these animals healthy prevents suffering and supports public health by reducing the spread of rabies, parasites, and other diseases that can affect animals and people.**

People may hold different views about whether someone experiencing homelessness should have a pet. The reality is that many do. These pets often provide companionship, security, and emotional support during periods of instability. **MCHA is the only organization in Monroe County and the surrounding region providing this type of care.**

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, the program **served about 400 pet visits**. The number of individual animals served remained nearly unchanged from 2024, but many **required fewer visits because their health had become more stable**. The cases requiring continued care were often more complex and needed ongoing monitoring, repeat treatments, and greater coordination.

MOBILE VACCINE CLINICS

MCHA's monthly Mobile Vaccine Clinics bring affordable preventive veterinary care directly into neighborhoods throughout Monroe County. By offering vaccines, wellness checks, and basic preventive services in convenient community locations, the clinics help remove barriers such as transportation, cost, and limited access to veterinary care.

Preventive care is one of the most effective ways to keep pets healthy and with the families who love them. Vaccinations protect against serious and preventable diseases, while routine wellness services can identify concerns before they become more difficult or expensive to treat.

These clinics also support community health by reducing the spread of contagious and zoonotic diseases and increasing vaccination coverage among pets throughout the county. By making this care easier to access, MCHA helps families avoid preventable medical crises, supports healthier pets, and reduces the risk that cost or lack of access leads to surrender.

IMPACT IN 2025

In 2025, MCHA's Mobile Vaccine Clinics **served 717 pets, a 14.9% increase over 2024** and more than double the number served just two years earlier. Monthly clinics continued throughout the year, helping families access vaccines and basic preventive care in convenient community locations.

Each clinic also gives pet owners an opportunity to ask questions, learn more about their pet's health, and connect with other MCHA services, including spay/neuter assistance.

Each month, more than a dozen staff members and volunteers work together to make our mobile vaccine clinic possible.

EDUCATION & ADVOCACY

Education remains an important part of MCHA's mission. Across our programs, staff and volunteers help pet owners better understand preventive care, responsible pet ownership, behavior, nutrition, safety, and the resources available to support them. That education happens through one-on-one conversations, community outreach, printed materials, social media, and events, giving families practical information they can use to make informed decisions for their pets.

In 2025, MCHA made the decision to sunset its Therapy Animal Program after many years of service in the community. We are proud of its impact and grateful to the volunteers and animals who made it possible. The change allowed MCHA to focus more resources on our core mission of keeping pets and families together through direct support and wraparound services.

SPECIAL THANKS

In November 2025, Monroe County Humane Association received an incredible in-kind donation of 18 pallets of pet food and supplies from **Chewy and Humane World for Animals**, formerly the Humane Society of the United States. This generous donation helped fuel the Pet Food Pantry program.

VOLUNTEERS

In 2025, MCHA's volunteer program continued to grow, with volunteers contributing **5,384 hours of service**, more than double the total from the year before. Based on the 2025 value of volunteer time calculated by Independent Sector, those hours represented an estimated **\$194,578 in contributed value.**

Their time supported nearly every part of our work, from caring for animals in Crisis Housing and keeping the Pet Food Pantry stocked to helping with events, office projects, and outreach.

Volunteers give MCHA the capacity to do more for animals and families every day. We are grateful to every person who chose to spend part of their year helping us serve our community.

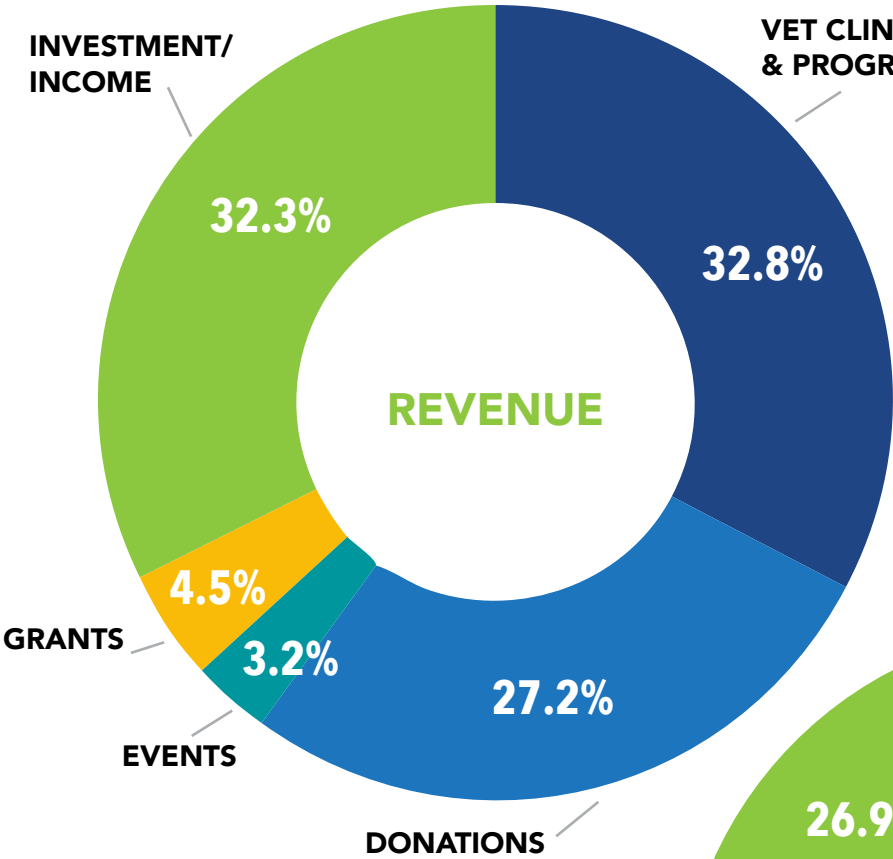

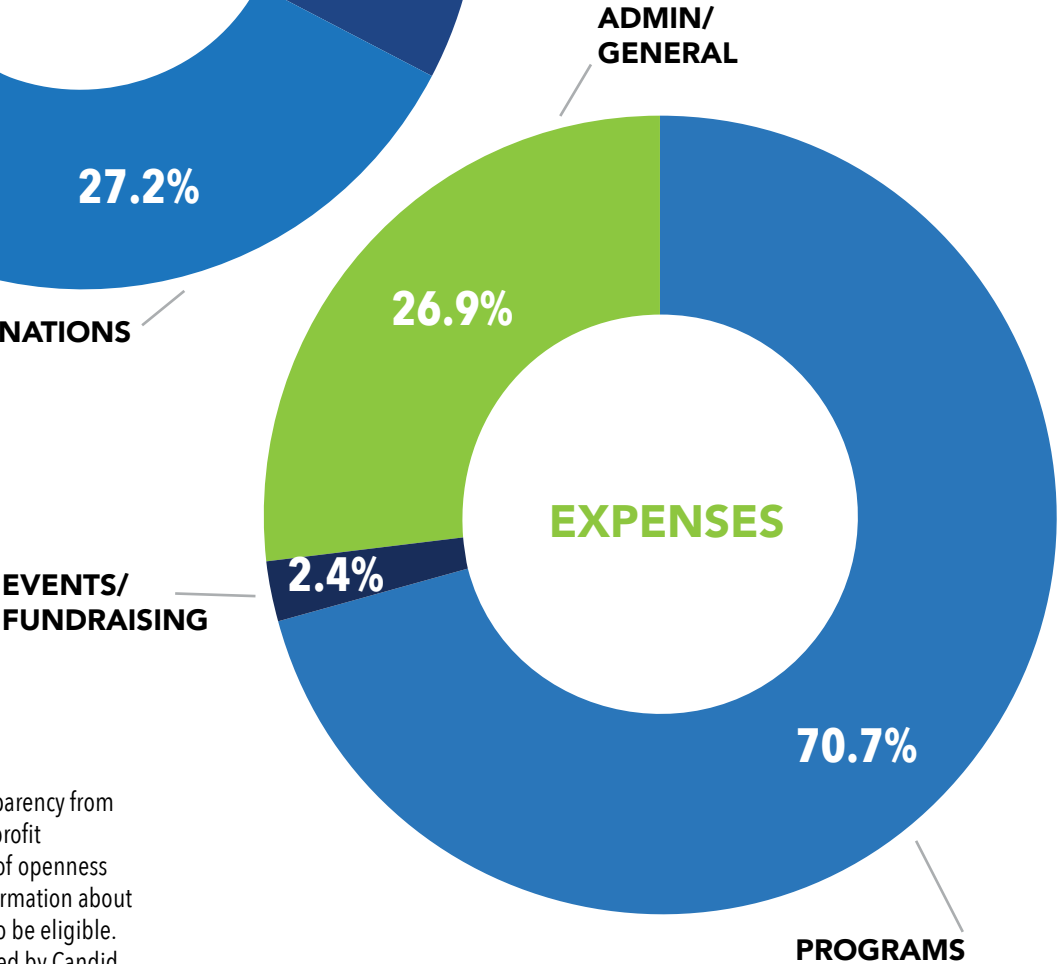

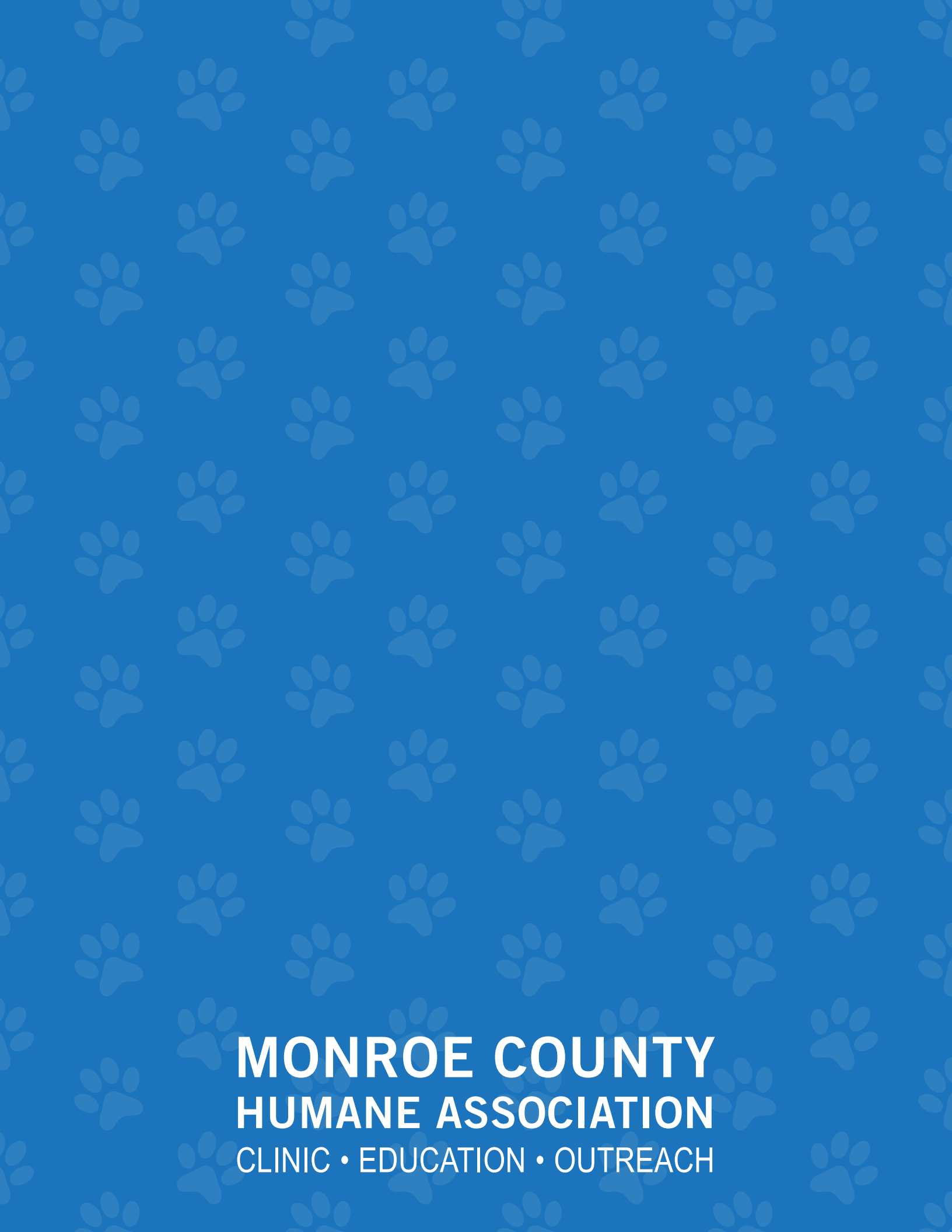
